One of the real joys of being so closely tied to Train Mountain and all of its magic is the dealings with the wonderful gang of friends we all call 'Members'. The Holiday Express event spawned an idea that we should try a similar event during the better weather of our regular summer run season. We had a couple of meetings discussing what the event should 'look like'. After all the Holiday Express was kind of a no brainer, what with the North Pole, snow, and, of course, Santa Claus. The decision was that we would have an event that was open to the public. We would invite in the local community to be participants as either vendors or just exhibitors. We would add to the event such extra fun items as a horse-drawn wagon ride, a mini car show, food vendors, even a Popsicle vendor! We then

needed to name the event. Since the event is all about the public and our local community we decided to call the event the Community Railroad Day. Aren't we clever?! Next came the planning of the event in terms of resources required. How many trains, how many train crews, first aid, porta-potties, and all the support staff such an undertaking requires. In the last issue of the Mountain Gazette, the call went out to you members to please come and help. I've used the word Wow before but Wow! you folks came through! Carol printed up 80 staff badges for the event. We ran out, so she printed another 30! We asked for those of you willing to haul the public to bring your trains and give us a hand. We had 12 to 14 trains running all day long. We all had safety vests on and everywhere one looked you saw a vest. It was just wonderful. When we ran for the Holiday Express, we made the short journey from Six Acres to Central Station and back. For this event, we ran some 20 to 25 minutes down to Midway Circle and let our passengers off to see the new attraction called the Midway Circle Garden Railroad. At Midway they could also take a horse-drawn wagon ride, or even grab a taco or two. They could then re-board another train and take a 20 to 25 minute train back up to Central Station. Upon arrival at Central Station they could enjoy the vendors, or the gift shop,



or the mini car show, or grab a great burger at the K & W Diner. Not a bad day's entertainment for \$5. We had a great test run just the week before because of the National Garden Railroad Convention up in Tacoma. We were listed in their program as a great place to visit on your way up to the convention. Our official day for them was on the 28th. We also had an article in the local Herald and News newspaper and they said we were open to the public. So we ended up with over 100 G-Scalers and another 150 or so public. We learned a lot from that test day and that made the big event even better. Bottom line, we had another very successful event that allowed the public to learn more about Train Mountain and our hobby. Thanks to all of you for such a strong showing of support for Train Mountain. What a great gang of friends!

As this is being written, we are in the middle of the August work week, and, although this is traditionally our smallest work week/meet, we are doing lots of those pesky jobs that have been on the white board for several months. The track is getting some much needed tune up and overall the place is looking pretty good. The steaming bay at the Garden Railroad is nearing completion and is almost ready for the installation of track! Weeding is going on all over the park. Peggy was seen without a rake in her hand; instead she had a shovel and was digging up the very tall weeds along the Highway 97 firewood wall! Good job Peggy.

Next up is traditionally our biggest work week/meet of the year. This year, we have a special task that needs to be accomplished during this event. We need to repair and get fully operational all of the water systems on the south side of the road. This is a requirement of our fire protection system. We have done some preliminary things, such as cleaning out some of the control boxes and other related items. During the September work week, we need to complete these tasks and be able to run the complete system. This will not be an easy task, as the system covers many acres of land and hundreds of connections. If we take on the task like we have all other requests, we should be able to get this accomplished. However, just as with every work week, when you check in please take a peek at the white board in Central Station for a complete list of tasks that Ross has listed for us to accomplish.

This has been a great running season and I've enjoyed seeing all of you having so much fun at Train Mountain. Please spread the word about how much is going on here and how much fun it is to be here. Remember, we are not just 7 ½ inch scale anymore with our growing G Scale railroad down at Midway Circle.

From Jeanne Meisser: Hugo and I arrived on May 29th and are leaving on Tues, 7/27, a total of slightly more than 8 weeks. As requested by TM we have kept a log of our hours worked.
