> 2012 Triennial Report By Dennis Ward, Volunteer Coordinator



It is time for an update on the upcoming Train Mountain Triennial/Silver Anniversary. As most of you know by now; the Triennial is scheduled for June 25th through July 1st 2012. The event will be preceded, June 16th through June 24th, by a work week. The work week is to put the final touches on the railroad and other infrastructure to insure that all of the participants can have an enjoyable week in a safe environment.

The Triennial Committee is a loosely knit group of VOLUNTEERS, most of who live within 10 miles of Train Mountain. Some of the very valuable VOLUNTEERS live further away and are doing their part via the internet and by telephone. This VOLUNTEER event will be successful. To make sure everyone has a chance to enjoy themselves we are looking for at least two hours of VOLUNTEER participation, freely given by each attendee, it will be greatly appreciated! We will have signup sheets available with an explanation of the help needed.

The Triennial Committee is still looking for someone to take charge of the South Portal Inspection and Communications committees. You can click the Committees tab at Triennial website http:// trainmountaintriennial.org to find where you might be able to best provide VOLUNTEER assistance.

This Silver Anniversary/Triennial event is looking to be the best yet at Train Mountain. As of January 31st we have 361 people signed up. This group has signed up to bring 156 trains totaling 6188 feet in length. Fifty five of these trains are live steam, 53 are gasoline powered diesel replicas, 46 are electric powered and 2 rail bikes are food & foot powered. (continued on

Additional participants, with their trains, are expected to sign up as the dates for the Triennial get nearer.

So far we have visitors from seven countries represented. The breakdown: United States—328, Australia—17, Canada—9, United Kingdom—3, Germany—2 and 1 each from Austria and New Zealand. Of the 328

from the US, most are Californians (102), Oregonians (71) and, Washingtonians (44). There are 14 from Nevada and 12 from Iowa. The other states represented in single digits are: Alabama (2), Arizona (4), Colorado (9), Florida (7), Georgia (7), Idaho (2), Illinois (1), Michigan (4), Minnesota (7), Montana (4), North Carolina (6),

Australian visitors come from New South Wales (5), Queensland (8) and Victoria (4).

The Canadian provinces represented are Alberta (4), British Columbia (3), and Manitoba (2). Nebraska (4), New Mexico (2), Ohio (9), Pennsylvania (7), Tennessee (4), and Utah (2).

TRAIN MOUNTAIN RAILROAD RULES OF THE ROAD

1. ALL TRAINS MUST HAVE BOTH AN ENGINEER AND A CONDUCTOR;

except for speeders and similar single-unit equipment that can be safely removed from the track by one person in the event of a breakdown. This specifically excludes radio-controlled trains. The minimum age for a conductor is seven, the age of reason.

- 2. SEVEN MILES PER HOUR MAXIMUM SPEED EQUALS TEN SECONDS BETWEEN MILEPOSTS. Exceptions are posted trackside.
- 3. 210' MINIMUM SEPARATION BETWEEN TRAINS EQUALS TWO MILEPOST LENGTHS TO THE END OF THE NEXT TRAIN.

The absence of signal blocks means that safety requires separation between trains.

- 4. ALL CONDUCTORS TO BE EQUIPPED WITH A RED FLAG. Minimum flag size is 12" x 12".
- 5. **CONDUCTOR TO FLAG TWO MILEPOST LENGTHS (210') BEHIND ANY STOPPED TRAIN.** This rule probably prevents more accidents than all of the other rules combined.

6. **SAFETY CHAINS OR DRAWBARS REQUIRED BETWEEN ALL CARS.** Some grades are more than a mile long and some have a 3.2% grade.. This rule prevents runaway cars.

7. ALL TRAINS TO HAVE A FRS RADIO TUNED TO CHANNEL 10. Someday, one of these radios will save the life of someone who has a heart attack while miles away from Central Station. (Note: Citizen Band Radio Channels are no longer monitored at Train Mountain.)

8. SOUND HORN OR WHISTLE(-----) AT W SIGN.

These signs are located 60' before the track crosses roads or other tracks.

9. SPARK ARRESTORS & ASHPANS REQUIRED ON ALL COAL & WOOD BURNERS. The summer fire danger in Klamath County is always "High" and often "Extreme."

10. DROP A GREEN BLOCK AT ANY DERAILMENT LOCATION. Not only does this tell track crews where problems are, it warns the next train that there is a track problem.

11. LEAVE SWITCH THROWS LINED FOR MAIN LINE. This is particularly important when the next train may have an engineer on his or her first trip on Train Mountain track.

NIGHT RUNNING

12. WHITE HEADLIGHT MOUNTED ON FRONT OF ENGINE. Steam engines may need battery-powered headlights.


13. RED TAILLIGHT MOUNTED ON REAR OF LAST CAR. The flashing lights sold in bicycle stores are a popular way of meeting this requirement.

14. CONDUCTOR TO USE FLASHLIGHT TO FLAG TWO MILEPOSTS (210') BEHIND ANY STOPPED TRAIN.
