Kitsap Live Steamer's Work Week 2017

In the past few years many tasks have been completed. In 2016, they worked on the transfer lift and track for the Lift, and installed the switches for phase 2 of Grand Junction. In 2015 we installed fire danger signs, reworked the three-way switches at the turn table, painted the new east wall in Hall of Flags and patched cracks in the pavement.



Also in 2014, we installed cargo doors in east wall


Hall of flags, hauled 54 carloads of logs from the old fire

pit, and installed 56 handrails. These projects add to the list from preceding years. So you can see, quite a lot gets accomplished by a small dedi-

This year our tasks include mounting the power unit to the transfer lift so the lift will be able to moved east and west under power. The Hobart Car and Foundry Group have worked all winter on this power unit. The tracks to lift need to be completed, installed and ballasted. Of course the new shipment of steel rail should have arrived from Switzerland so new panels need to be fabricated. Also areas like Aspen Grove require inspection and made passable.

The job of Track Assignment is very important and allows all of us who come to the Triennial, to have a place to park our equipment, and to be close to any special services we may need (like a battery charger) and to have a great time. For 2015 we were hard pressed to be able to supply all of the battery-powered trains a place to recharge over night. The situation will be the same for 2018 as the battery folks are the fastest growing part of the hobby. So how about joining in the fun THIS summer and let's build some more track! Remember John Black has been quoted over and over, saying "more track more fun!" Anyhow we need more places to park folks. It's as simple as that. Once we get the new track installed we will let Dean know about it and he will make sure to put it to good use.

As a parting shot to this column let me just say that we had two major concerns about the 2018 Triennial, and one of them is now taken care of, so a huge sigh of relief from your past chairs. Next up Triennial Chairman.

Triennial Chairman (the ultimate volunteer coordinator)

Quentin started the ball rolling by hosting the IBLS Meet in 2000. But he had a secret weapon though; he had Ross Perrin, the General manager. So the folks that VOLUNTEERED to work the event didn't have to deal with all of the PREP work or any of the POST work. Ross and his staff handled all of that. This continued through the early Triennial years, 2003, 2006, and 2009. For 2012 and 2015 the prep work and post work was under control of the LOCAL co-chairs as we had daily access to waste management, propane suppliers, porta-potties, food service, etc. We also had the excellent help of the TMI staff for those things that a volunteer just doesn't need to work on but still needs to be done whether we have a meet going or not.

Well to assist the 2018 Chairman we have decided that we (the local dudes) will continue to do those kinds of pre-post tasks, so that means the Triennial Chairman just needs to concentrate on

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the 38 committee chairs and the 350 or so daily volunteers that it takes to put on the event. The Chairman needs to be in charge of the daily volunteer morning meetings, and of course be the goto person in charge of the meet. The TMRR board will be responsible for reviewing and ensuring that already established guidelines are in place and followed by the Triennial Chairman.

To assist the chairman we need to first find out who that is going to be and then we need to fill up those 38 committee chairs, actually there are 30 spots left as we already have 8 folks signed up (thank you). If you don't want to be the chair but would still like to assist on one of the committees, please email the office or me and we will *get er' done*. Some of the committees are small, just one or two folks, some are very large such as load/unload, people shuttles, and others. We need ya', please sign up.

Containerville Update

The installation of the second row of storage containers is progressing as planned except for a delay due to weather. For the last two months everything at Train Mountain has been under a deep snow cover. The foundations for the new containers have been poured. All the new containers (with roll up doors) have been completed in Portland and are ready for shipment to Train Mountain. Shipping will start as soon as the snow melts. The new transfer/lift table power unit has been built and will be installed in April.

There are still some storage containers for sale. They are \$5,000 each with roll up door. If purchased, you would own the container but would be required to pay an annual storage space fee. This fee for the full year in 2017 is \$375. The fee would be prorated from time of occupancy. The contracts and rental information are available from the office. You can make a down payment on a container for \$2,500. Full payment would be required when your container is ready for use.

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Staying in One of Train Mountain's Rooms

More and more of our members are becoming aware that Train Mountain has motel type rooms that our members can stay in while visiting. These rooms are becoming very popular and it is now necessary we publish our procedures for renting one of these rooms. Joyce has done a great job of putting together the following description of our rooms and our rental and reservation policies.

Accommodations Room Rentals:

About the Accommodations Rooms:

The New York Central, Great Northern, Santa Fe Chief, Southern Pacific and The Loft rooms are for accommodations. The rooms are available for rent year-round. Only members may rent these rooms, however, they may bring guests who may also stay in the rooms under the member's reservation. If a member brings a guest or guests, the member must be with them at all times while they are at Train Mountain.

Great Northern, also known as "The Bunk Room", has 4 twin beds. <u>Only</u> in the Great Northern room may the beds be rented individually. Please note that if you request only a bed in this room, rather than the whole room, you may be sharing the room with others who also requested only a bed in Great Northern. This is a downstairs room.

New York Central, Santa Fe Chief and **Southern Pacific** rooms each have 2 twin beds. Each room may only be reserved and rented in its entirety. They may <u>not</u> be reserved or rented "by the bed". These three rooms are downstairs.

The Loft has a king size bed with a large bedroom separate from a living room area. It also has a large bathroom with a bidet and a Jacuzzi tub in addition to regular bathroom features. It is an upstairs room with nice views off of the balconies at each end. This room is recommended only for those who can climb stairs well.

There is a foldaway bed that can be rented and placed in a downstairs room for an additional person at an extra cost. For safety reasons, the foldaway bed cannot be carried or placed upstairs in the loft.

Members may bring sleeping bags and air mattresses or pads in order to make extra sleeping places in a room, however, maximum room occupancy may not be exceeded. Notify the office if you are planning on doing this.

All rooms have a microwave and small refrigerator. Most, but not all, rooms have coffee makers. All rooms are equipped with a shower. Southern Pacific has a regular bathtub with a shower. Free Wi-Fi is available. There is no satellite or cable TV here. Hooking your own DVD player up to the room's TV monitor *might* work for playing movies.

Persons who have reserved rooms may use the kitchen to prepare meals. There is also a coffee maker in the kitchen. Please wash all dishes, put everything away and turn off all appliances as soon as you are done cooking and eating.

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Pets:

You are not permitted to bring your pets into any of the buildings or to keep them in any of the accommodations rooms.

Smoking:

No smoking is allowed in any of the buildings or accommodations rooms. There are <u>ONLY</u> three designated smoking areas at Train Mountain. These are: outside the front of the Backshop, outside the east door of the Hall of Flags, and outside of the Motor Pool building. No smoking is permitted anywhere else on Train Mountain property.

Accommodations Rooms Reservation & Cancellation Policies:

Room reservations may generally be made up to a year in advance. Requests for rooms for upcoming Triennial work weeks and meets may be made as much as three years in advance.

A person who has reserved a room for an entire work week and meet, and who is at Train Mountain on the Sunday of that work week, can reserve a room for the following year's work week and/or meet on that work week Sunday. The person must physically be at Train Mountain and come into the Train Mountain office to do this. No proxies and no reservations by email, mail, fax or phone will be accepted at that time. Others present later in the work week and at the meet will be able to reserve for the following year's work week and meet while they are present at Train Mountain. Once the meet is over, rooms that have not been reserved for the following year's meet will be made available to other members on a first come first served basis and through the regular reservation system where you can make your reservation by phone, email or in the office (and, in the future, possibly online).

If the dates for the following year's work weeks or meets are not yet known when a request is made, the name of the member along with the request date and time will be placed on a request list. Rooms will then be reserved, in order by earliest date and time of request first to latest date and time of request last, when the work week and meet dates do become known (usually by October of the current year). Work weeks and meets are generally around the same times year to year and are often within only a day or two of variance from the previous year.

We will do our best to inform you if it looks like there are more requests for rooms than there are rooms for a specific meet, work week or event. If there are more requests than rooms, you will be placed on a standby list (described later).

Train Mountain has the right to set aside or reserve one or more rooms for meet officials and possibly at times others as needed and for any meet, work week or other period of time. This right takes precedence over member requests for rooms.

At this time no advance payment or deposit is required. Please reserve ONLY for the nights you plan to stay. For example: Do not reserve for an entire work week if you-only plan on being here for two days of the work week. Reserve for only for those two days!—

How to make a request for a reservation: By phone: 541-783-3030, by e-mail: <u>info@trainmtn.org</u> or by walk-in.

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Tips for planning: During work weeks and meets the rooms generally book up quickly and as much as a year in advance, especially for the Operations, Narrow Gauge and Big Build meets. Room requests for Triennial meets and work weeks may be enough to fill all of the rooms as much as three years in advance. **Rooms are often available during non-work week or non-meet times**, but again, plan in advance and call ahead to make a request to reserve.

Standby Lists: If you request a reservation for a room and the room you want or all of the rooms are booked, you may ask to be put on a standby list. Names will be listed in order of earliest request & time to latest request & time. If a room opens because of a cancellation, the person with the earliest standby request will be contacted first. Contact will continue to be made going from earliest request to latest request until someone reserves the room. The remaining names will stay on the standby list in case there are any other cancellations which create openings. If other openings occur because of cancellations, members on the standby list will be contacted as described above.

Room cancellations must be made no later than 48 hours before the first day of your room reservation. If your reservation is for a work week or meet, the room cancellation must be made 7 days before the first day of your room reservation. This frees the room in time for others to reserve it. It also helps in proper planning and utilization of our housekeeper's time! Train Mountain Institute may charge you for any nights you reserved, but cancelled with less than 48 hours notice for a non-meet, non-work week reservation, or with less than 7 day notice for a work week or meet reservation or for which you failed to cancel and did not stay.

Note: Train Mountain Institute may change its room reservations and cancellations policies or room rates and do so with or without written notice from time to time as may become necessary. Please always check with the office regarding current policies.

After hours arrival: If you will be arriving after office hours on a week-day or are arriving on a Saturday or Sunday, please contact the office for the gate code, kitchen door code and to have the room key or keys set out for you.

Check out time is 11:00AM. Please leave room keys inside the room and leave the door facing the Hall of Flags unlocked.

Before departing, please be sure to check the room and make sure you have collected all of your personal belongings. Found items will be mailed at your request only after we receive payment from you for shipping.

Payment:

Payment is due at the time of your arrival. Pay inside the office during normal office hours. We accept cash, checks, money orders or cashier's checks and most credit and debit cards.

If the office is closed when you arrive, pay at the office before you leave, or if you are arriving and departing over the week-end when the office is closed, you may pay before your arrival by phone using a credit or debit card. Otherwise, you may leave a payment by check and leave the check in the room with the room keys before you depart.

There is a \$5.00 fee for any room key not returned to Train Mountain within two weeks of your check-out. If you mistakenly leave with a key, please notify the office and mail it back to us postage paid right away.

Please Note: The accommodations rooms are becoming more and more popular particularly during work weeks and meets. And, as much as we would like to accommodate everyone who requests a room for a work week and/or meet or for other periods, sometimes there are just simply not enough rooms or beds available to fill all of the requests.

Unlike many of the other railroad parks or clubs which mainly have members from their immediate area, Train Mountain has members all across the United States and throughout other parts of the world. Many have to travel hundreds or thousands of miles to get here and many have to plan as much as a year or more in advance for their travel and accommodations.

Before making a request for a room, please have back-up plans in mind for other places to stay in case the rooms are already booked. Rooms are often available when there is **no** work week or meet going on, but are sometimes all taken up then, too. There are three campgrounds with ample room at Train Mountain, and there are several resorts, inns, bed & breakfasts, other campgrounds, RV parks, vacation rentals and motels within the surrounding communities. These, too, may be booked full during certain times of the year, so again, advance planning is key!

We look forward to having you here and hope you enjoy your stay!

With this winter's weather and road conditions, we haven't gotten any tourists this past month. As things get warmer and drier, we should be seeing more. If you love greeting people and giving pleasant educational and informative tours, you might make a great docent (museum tour guide) in Central Station, out walking or on a train and we would love to have you volunteering here!

To all of our volunteers, I just want to let you know how much you are appreciated. You are what makes and keeps Train Mountain humming! Without you Train Mountain would not exist! So, keep up the great work!

Visitors to Train Mountain:

Train Mountain is very popular and is continually attracting visitors from throughout the world. We announce that our hours are from 10:00 AM until 3:00 PM Monday through Friday during the summer, and 10:00 AM to 2:00 PM during the winter. The office is closed on weekends except during meets, and then only when volunteers are available to open the office.

Our insurance advisors request that all people (members and visitors) complete and sign a liability release. If **YOU** as a member encounter visitors on the property without a visitors pass please direct them to the office so that we can insure that a release has been completed and a visitors pass has been issued.

If **YOU**, as a member, open the gate and allow visitors to pass through - **YOU** are responsible to see that the release has been completed, and **YOU** are liable for them until they sign a release. Releases are available in the mailboxes near the office for those times the office is closed. There are also releases available in the kitchen and in the back shop.

If you do not want to, or do not have the time to, ensure that the releases are completed - then please graciously explain that the train park is closed to visitors and that the open hours are normally (Winter - 10:00 AM until 2:00 PM)(Summer - 9:00 AM until 3:00 PM) Monday through Friday. To arrange other hours visitors should call the office at 541-783-3030.

PUBLICATION DEADLINE CHANGING:

Submissions to the Gazette must be received by the 15th of the month of publication.

The fifteenth of the month is to be the last day to submit material. Material received after the 15th of the month may be held until the following month or rejected.

What Is IFPL?

IFPL is the acronym for Industrial Fire Precaution Levels. These levels are applicable to industrial work performed in forested areas and pertain primarily to the use of power equipment or activities that might produce sparks or fire. IFPL limits the hours of operation for industrial type work and provides limits to what kind of work can be performed. They can require **FIRE WATCHES** after approved work is completed.

How do these levels apply to TMRR? The primary application is to the employees of Train Mountain Institute as they are the primary operators of powered equipment. When IFPL level 1 and higher is in effect, regulations require members to carry firefighting tools on their trains.

These levels are generally posted in Roman Numerals and are on the same sign with the Adjective Fire Danger Level. They may seem counterintuitive so please read carefully.

(See the pictures on the next page that show the IFPL levels at the top of the sign.)

Level I

Closed season: meaning Fire season has been declared and all Fire Season related rules are in effect.

Level II

Partial Hoot Owl: All Industrial activities must take place between 8:00 PM and 1:00 PM followed by a fire watch after work is halted.

Level III

Partial Shut Down: Prohibited activities Power saws, Cable Yarding. Permitted activities between 8:00 Pm and 1:00 PM * (see further explanation below); tractor skidder operations when equipment being used has a blade capable of cutting a fire line. Mechanized loading or hauling of any product or material; blasting, welding or cutting of any metal, or any other activity which may cause sparks. These permitted activities must be followed with a fire watch at completion of work.

Level IV

General Shut Down: All operations are prohibited.

*The hours of permitted activities under Level III start in late evening through the night and into the following morning halting at 1:00 PM. These are the hours of the day when the accidental starting of a fire is at its lowest point. Generally after noon the temperature is increasing along with a drop in humidity followed with an increase in wind velocity.

More information can be found on the TMRR website. Click the tab "Safety at TM", then click "Fire Equipment Self Inspection Form". This document explains the fire watch and required equipment for all Industrial Operations covered by the IFPL.

As fire danger levels increase, our vigilance and awareness must also gear up. Everyone must be on constant FIRE WATCH while at Train Mountain.




