Even though that big number on the bottom of the page says Eleven (11 months until the Triennial) it's only 45 days before the registration process starts. But before you jump on the registration page and start filling in the necessary information how about making a *Personal Check List* of things you've got to bring with you. Some of the

necessary items pop into mind like tools, gas cans, etc. Some others might easily be forgotten. If you're battery powered you need a charger, a long extension cord, and if you register late you might need a generator,. We have a limited number of plug-in spots, and we are expecting some 150 battery powered trains. If you're a steamer try and figure out your consumption of steam related items like steam oil and bring what you think you might need with you. Remember we will have 100 plus steamers needing stuff so some supplies may be limited! The rest of us gasoline folks need to remember our fuel cans, funnels, etc. as well. Also don't forget the creature comfort goodies like lawn chairs, ice chests, maybe a sun umbrella, lots of sun screen, and probably a good hat! LOL.

Now to the most important part, I have heard from several folks they are planning on coming to the event to help out but are NOT bringing their train! That statement bothers me a lot! If we cannot put on a major event that allows us to also participate in the event then we are definitely doing something wrong. We have done this major event before; there should be very few surprises. The Triennial Steering Committee is trying to design in more time for our volunteers to ENJOY the event and not just WORK the event. We need committee chairmen and once those positions are filled we will have the chairs start recruiting committee members. Members should plan on no more than a single two hour shift in a 24 hour period. That leaves 22 hours to be a RUNNING participant in the event.

We cannot do the Triennial without you but having a Triennial without any trains doesn't work either! PLEASE plan on bringing your train and running on our great railroad along with all the others in our great hobby.

From the Desk of Train Mountain Railroad President August 2021 By Jeff Mills

As expected, the August Meet was lightly attended however the progress at Train Mountain during this week was monumental. At the start of the work week, Duane Kaasa and his volunteers finished the painting and lettering of the New York Central Sleeper Car. This is a great addition to our entry way and is seen by all our visitors. This was a massive project and took some serious volunteer hours to complete.

The next achievement by our corps of volunteers, lead by Dale Furseth, was the replacement of the 4 switches and cross over track leading into Crisp yard. As it existed, it was aluminum rail on wood ties. The Wooden Ties had failed and were no longer able to retain the track screws causing loss of gauge. I think most of us, at one time or another has had a derailment at this point. There was always a collection of green blocks here indicating track problems. Dale's crew got this work completed in two days. A big thank you for all that participated in this endeavor.

Then Wednesday evening came the thunderstorm of the decade. Late in the evening the thunder and lightning came rolling in, followed by Monsoon Rains. The rains produced between 2 and 3" of hard precipitation in only a half hour, causing flash floods, mudslides, downed trees, and loss of power to the entire Train Mountain Property.

The next morning, volunteers were clearing debris from a downed tree partially blocking South Chiloquin Rd near the K&W gate. The tree took out the power line and the internet cable. With the road cleared for traffic, motorists were able to safely proceed past our property and the line crews restore power and internet later that day.

Next, an inspection of the track began, to discover runoff from Steiger Butte had been extreme and creating mudslides on large proportions in the Burn area. The runoff water came in sheets and when it reached the roads and railroad grades, they became water channels. This washed out the gravel ballast, plastic underlayment and in some cases twisted the track beyond reuse. The areas affected were Crane Station Siding, around Hope Circle up the grade to Panzik Water Tower and down to the Grade crossing on the road up to Steiger Butte. Areas that did not get washed out, were buried in mud up to three feet deep.

Now what do we do? The track around Hope and back to Witcombe Wye was just opened during the last days of the Ops Meet. All that work has been undone by Mother Nature. This produced a lot of hand ringing and consternation followed by in-depth discussion. Three proposals were made. The last









one was to repair and re-install the track into its previous route. Again, Dale Furseth and Bill Shepard started on this. They removed the damaged panels. Richard Cox and Luke Conner with Train Mountain heavy equipment re-established the grades and dug some diversion ditches to direct any future run off away from the tracks. New plastic and ballast were ordered. The track laying began. Dale posted many photos on Facebook and provided daily progress reports. One of the Gravel Tipples was moved to the Hope area and was used to ballast the newly laid track. In about two weeks' time the Main Line track was re-installed and ballasted. Many thanks are due all who helped with this project.

The Meet week was concluded with a Progressive Dinner and Poker Run. This event was organized by Marcia Furseth, Lindsay Eddy, Rose Maria Dobbs, Dana Ward and Barbra Ward. We travelled around the layout to obtain each course of our dinner meal. Dale Furseth organized the poker run and it was held in a different manner than in previous years. The poker run was fun and was the talk of the evening. The meal was excellent and everyone had a great time. It is so good to be able to socialize again as that is a very important part of Train Mountain experience. Special thanks to all who put this event together and to all who participated. We did not set a cost for this event and all who participated ponied up and the expens-



es were covered with the surplus funds donated to the Richard Cox Waterfall Project. We will do this again by popular demand.

Crane station Siding and the Panzik Sidings need to be dug out, requiring the track to be trimmed. Hope Circle and Flitton Yard need to be rebuilt as they were damaged by the flood and logging operations resulting from the 242 Fire.

Over the next Work Week, will be the Big Build, with concentration on the Rio Grande Division Track Replacement. This will entail replacement track from Sannich Siding to Lillyville. We will also need to organize a work party for Crane Siding.

Now, if Mother Nature will let up a little, and with a little more volunteer hard work, we will be closer to welcoming everyone to the 2022 Triennial.



July/August Report an article by Dennis Ward—Track Superintendent

Wow! I was out of town during publication of the July *Gazette*. A lot of activity since June. As those of you who follow Facebook know, we had a flood earlier this month. Most of the track in the 2-4-2 fire area that had been painstakingly reopened by our stellar track crew, led by Dale Furseth, was either washed out or covered up with silt. While Hope Circle is still closed—and will be for the fore-seeable future—the Hope loop is open again. Richard Cox and Luke Conner removed the majority of the silt, up to two feet deep in some areas, covering the track. Dale and Bill Sheppard removed the washed out section to allow Richard space to repair the grade. Once the grade was reestablished Bill and Dale and some visiting members reinstalled the plastic underlayment—about 800'. They then replaced the washed out track panels, most of which were recovered from the trees and bushes downstream from the grade.

We highly recommend slow order on all track between Crane Siding to just beyond Panzik Siding for the foreseeable future. The Crane and Panzik sidings are both still covered in silt. We can all help to get them open. On your next visit bring a shovel, rake and broom. All indications are that the track is just covered and needs to be uncovered to be useable. We can all help to open these important sidings. For those running live steam—there is water available at Schubert Wye.

During the August Meet work week. Jeff Mills and his crew installed a remote switch stand at Youngstown. This stand allows the uphill traffic crews to chose Dogwalk (alternate) or continue up the Serpentine (primary) routes. This installation required relocation of some of the Youngstown Yard tracks. Dale, with help from Steve Eddy and myself got that accomplished.

Dale also managed to replace track around the Ellingson Turntable, where the tour trains operate, with aluminum rail on plastic ties. The project, almost complete, is ongoing.

The used track, aluminum rail on wood ties, which had accumulated in Klamath and Western Yard has been dismantled by myself and an outstanding crew which included Marc Mattioda, Mike Hoak, Dave Savage and others who came when I was not there to identify them—like the elves in the cobblers shop.

The Big Build Meet work week? Upgrade the track on the Rio Grand Loop. My calculations show a little over 2700' feet of track to replace including four switches. Switches at Saanich (75' left), Sharon's Shortcut (Wye) and Rio Grand Siding (100' right and 100' left).


Why I Want/Need to be a Triennial Vendor

Please come out and help us shine up the diamond.



The technology is called "CAPTCHA", or in our case "reCAPTCHA" and is quickly being the standard for online protection against robots, which pose a real problem to web sites. This is replacing the (to me) very irritating practice of trying to figure out what letters and numbers they are showing in fuzzy text. If you have questions or problems getting around the new challenge (or if you are a robot!), feel free to give Joyce a call in the office.

If you do not want to, or do not have the time to, ensure that the releases are completed - then please graciously explain that the train park is closed to visitors and that the open hours are normally (Winter - 10:00 AM until 2:00 PM) (Summer - 9:00 AM until 3:00 PM) Monday through
