The Fall Colors Meet completes this year's activities. The weather was great for running the tracks. Mother Nature cooperated by keeping the rain and sub-freezing temperatures to late night or early mornings. These low temperatures resulted in the deciduous tree leaves turning yellow and red for a brilliant display.

The meet was a big success and well attended. While there was not an official Work Week quite a bit of important work was accomplished. The Wonder Bread Mafia led by Matt Thomas and Dale Furseth, with support from Bill Shepherd and cadre of volunteers, made a clean up of Aspen Loop. You can actually see the ground now, rather than all the "dead-fall" common in an Aspen Grove. Later, this group pulled some troublesome track panels and dug out large pine root balls. They also did trim work on the Panama Canal Track.

Another group, lead by Leonard Houpt and Gil Dominguez, dug out and re-laid about half of the track at Hope Circle. The plan is to complete the work this spring. Leonard also plans improvements to Hope Circle but more on that in a future article.

During this winter, the Track Shop lead by Dennis Ward will be manufacturing track panels and switches. Dale Furseth will be laying replacement track on Sharon's Short Cut and Lucky North and the interchanges of these routes. This replacement will be the last major stretches of track with wood ties.

We are in countdown for the 2022 Triennial. Registration is open and the registration fees will go up on January 1st. Register early to take advantage of these lower fees. Early registration helps us in many ways and allow our organizing committee to better commit to supplies and services. We are preparing information pages on specific subjects. October Report

Well the Fall Colors meet has come and gone. While there is no official work week during the Fall Colors meet a lot of work was accomplished. Forest debris remediation in Aspen Grove was the main focus and most if not all of the dead wood was cleaned up and made available for firewood or controlled burns. Work was started on reopening Hope Circle and Crane Siding water stop was made available again.

Robert Stevens has been very busy disassembling the used track. There is a lot of used aluminum rail available for sale a \$0.50 per foot. We have thousands of board feet of used Port Orford cedar ties avail for free as are the used screws and tie plates.

Our plastic tie material finally arrived on the 8th of the month so Charlie Bill Schubert and I, with help from Dale Furseth, have been busy building track panels. While awaiting the tie material, Charlie and I built switches to replenish the switch inventory. With all the track replacement which went on over the season the switch inventory was depleted.

Track replacement continues as long as the weather permits. Since the Big Build last month, Dale and Bill Shepherd have replaced several hundred feet of the old wooden tied track. If the weather holds all of main track should be on plastic ties by the end of the year. All that is left to do is Sharon's Shortcut and the track from Midway Circle to Red Ant Junction, track that I refer to as Lucky North.

I want to reiterate—used aluminum rail is available at Train Mountain for 50 cents per foot. Used tie plates and track screw are free. As are the used Port Orford cedar ties.

Why I Want/Need to be a Triennial Vendor




From the Signal Maintainers

The PRR position light signal project is moving along. The signal along the bunk cars at MP1078 is now operational and integrated into our signal system. The face plate for the upper arms has been installed. Blanks to cover the unused openings are being fabricated, as is a face plate for the lower arm.

The signal near the west end of the yard has had its heavy components mounted on the mast. Thanks to Luke Connor and the Genie lift for this. It still needs to be wired and have conduit buried to bring in 12v power.



The technology is called "CAPTCHA", or in our case "reCAPTCHA" and is quickly being the standard for online protection against robots, which pose a real problem to web sites. This is replacing the (to me) very irritating practice of trying to figure out what letters and numbers they are showing in fuzzy text. If you have questions or problems getting around the new challenge (or if you are a robot!), feel free to give Joyce a call in the office.

If you do not want to, or do not have the time to, ensure that the releases are completed - then please graciously explain that the train park is closed to visitors and that the open hours are normally (Winter - 10:00 AM until 2:00 PM) (Summer - 9:00 AM until 3:00 PM) Monday through
