

## Train Mountain Development of the Steel Switch Frog

All of the original switches at Train Mountain used cast aluminum switch frogs. These were used in conjunction with the aluminum West Cost Rail on Port Orford Cedar ties. After decades of use of the cast frogs it became apparent that a more robust and wear resistant frog was needed, thus complementing our upgrade to steel rail on plastic ties. Our search led us to Maricopa Live Steamers who manufactures a steel frog for their own use and also sells them.

Upon analyzation of the Maricopa Design it was determined that their fabrication process had too much machining. Also a significant amount of router work



needed to be done on the ties. Russ Wood and Richard Cox started to modify the Maricopa design. Their design goals were to use as much **Off the Shelf Materials** as possible with the lowest amount of machining time.

The most important part of the switch frog is the heel (the isosceles triangle shape) in the middle of the frog. This has to be a precise part which keeps the wheels tracking in the desired direction, preventing a derailment. The sharpness of the point is what makes the frog work. This is where the cast aluminum frog falls down in performance, as this point gets worn and then breaks off. When this occurs the wheels passing through the switch will take random tracks causing what is known as a split switch. A result of this is either a derailment or the trucks on a car end up on two diverging tracks, both of these are undesirable.

On the Train Mountain designed frog the heel in the middle of the frog is cut from ½" thick steel plate. This is precisely accomplished with a CNC water jet cutter. Being that TMRR does not have a CNC water jet machine this is the only part outsourced. We are fortunate that a company in Klamath Falls has produced these parts for us at a reasonable cost.

The rest of the parts are cut from  $\frac{1}{4}$ " x 2" strap steel,  $\frac{1}{2}$ " x  $\frac{1}{2}$ " square steel bar stock and  $\frac{1}{4}$ " x 1-  $\frac{1}{2}$ " strap steel. This stock is cut to size on a band saw, deburred and made ready for welding. Laying out of the parts for welding is accomplished by using some  $\frac{1}{4}$ " spacers and a careful placement of the frog heel and securely clamping into place (see accompanying photo). Once welding is completed the frog is ready for installation.



Train Mountain primarily uses two radii switches 75' and 100' these require a #9 and a #11 frog respectively. The number designation of the frog is determined by the distance from the point going toward the base where the base is one inch wide. Hence#11 is 11" from point to where the base is 1" wide. There are numerous reference materials that explain this and other factors of design.

Train Mountain is currently making the switch frogs in batches of 25. These fabricated switch frogs have significantly reduced both the time and expense of building a switch. For additional information on this subject please refer to Discover Live Steam June 2007 article titled, "Switch Building at Maricopa Live steamers". ## Stroke has a new indicator! Medical Information

We are a senior hobby and we also have a lot of senior visitors. The following article is provided for informational purposes only.

During a BBQ, a woman stumbled and took a little fall - she assured everyone that she was fine (they offered to call paramedics) ...she said she had just tripped over a brick because of her new shoes.

They got her cleaned up and got her a new plate of food. While she appeared a bit shaken up, Jane went about enjoying herself the rest of the evening.

Jane's husband called later telling everyone that his wife had been taken to the hospital - (at 6:00 PM Jane passed away.) She had suffered a stroke at the BBQ. Had they known how to identify the signs of a stroke, perhaps Jane would be with us today. Some don't die. They end up in a helpless, hopeless condition instead.

It only takes a minute to read this.

A neurologist says that if he can get to a stroke victim within 3 hours he can totally reverse the effects of a stroke...totally. He said the trick was getting a stroke recognized; diagnosed, and then getting the patient medically cared for within 3 hours, which is tough.

#### >>RECOGNIZING A STROKE<<

Thank God for the sense to remember the '3' steps, *STR*. Read and Learn!

Sometimes symptoms of a stroke are difficult to identify. Unfortunately, the lack of awareness spells disaster. The stroke victim may suffer severe brain damage when people nearby fail to recognize the symptoms of a stroke.

Now doctors say a bystander can recognize a stroke by asking three simple questions:

**S** \*Ask the individual to SMILE.

**T** \*Ask the person to TALK and SPEAK A SIMPLE SENTENCE (Coherently) (i.e. Chicken Soup)

**R** \*Ask him or her to RAISE BOTH ARMS.

#### New Sign of a Stroke ----- Stick out Your Tongue

**The New Indicator:** Another 'sign' of a stroke is this: Ask the person to 'stick' out their tongue. If the tongue is 'crooked', IE., if it goes to one side or the other that is also an indication of a stroke.

If he or she has trouble with **ANY ONE** of these tasks, call emergency number **911** immediately and describe the symptoms to the dispatcher.

**Note:** If at Train Mountain call **911** and then call the office and let them know that you have called **911** and where you are located on the railroad. **DO NOT** move unless you are instructed to do so by the office. Emergency personnel need to get to you and if you move that will only delay the help.

#### Camera Tricks on the Train Mountain Railroad Website

The talented web guys have been working on a few more enhancements for our club website. One of them has been in testing for a while and they recently turned it on for good on the club website. So here's some fun stuff using the really cool new Camera Page feature(s).

## What you see next is an image like the one illustrated here:



#### This is where some of the tricks come in.

Notice it has two arrows, one to the left and one to the right. Click on the left arrow and go back a day. Click on the right arrow you can go forward a day if the page exists.

Another thing you will quickly notice there multiple images for each of the cameras on this page. There are TM cameras, which take pictures only when there is some motion in front of the camera. On some days like today it is windy and there are things blowing in the wind and we sometimes get funny pictures, especially when it's snowing!

Next up look between the arrows and there is a date entry box. What's cool about this neat feature is lets say you were here for a meet on the 12<sup>th</sup>. When you get home you can SCROLL *backwards* to the 12<sup>th</sup> and see if you're on camera.

Finally the web page shows a thumbnail and you can click on the thumbnail and you will get a full size image. So here's another trick to try. On the initial thumbnail right click on the image and then select **open in new tab**. When the new tab opens up you can click on the new image and get an enhanced enlargement, pretty cool.

So thanks to the web crew (Tom, Dale) we now have even more to show our thousands of web viewers.

- 7. Points instead of just Car Counts to determine productivity:

Points for cars moved

Points for distance of cars moved

Points for difficulty of cars moved

We want to accommodate everyone at the Ops Meet, including those that do not have a train. We are working on a new system that will connect the crew(s) without trains to those that have trains. We'll even provide 2-seater passenger cars so any consist can carry an expanded crew. Every train should make an effort to take on additional train crew to make sure all attendees have a fulfilling and fun experience during the Ops Meet!

All these things and more will be explained and your questions answered when you attend the Orientation meetings on Thursday and Friday mornings.

We are trying a new approach to conducting the morning Orientation Meetings this year. The General Meeting will only address announcements, safety issues, and other general topics common to all participants.

Following the General Meeting there will be two concurrent sessions of a "Freight Train Orientation" meeting and a "Passenger Train Orientation" meeting. These meetings will only address the specific procedures dealing with each type of train.

We are also trying to schedule Signal Orientation sessions where Train Mountain signals are explained in detail and attendees are shown how to monitor (on their smartphones) the current status of all signals throughout the system. This orientation was first introduced in 2018, it received excellent reviews and was highly recommended by those in attendance.

## All meetings with be less than 30 minutes each!!!

We encourage all participants (new and those with previous Ops experience) to attend all meetings at least once before heading out to switch or run the passenger routes.

The goal of the Ops Meet is to include all participants of the meet in having a memorable, hands-on experience while learning about how a real railroad goes about its business. More Ops details will be included in upcoming issues of the Gazette.

Whether you attend for pleasure, competition, education, fun, camaraderie, or all the above, make plans now for the 2019 Ops Meet.

There have been a few changes made to the member's site, specifically where payment information is entered. The most noticeable change is that we have added a question asking if you are a robot. You check the box and depending on a bunch of things, you may be asked to choose from a set of pictures. You may be asked to click the pictures that show street signs, or click on pictures that show store fronts. It seems silly, but the questions and challenges are carefully crafted and updated by Google, and have an amazing success rate at determining if the entity pressing the keys is a real person or a computer program ("robot") trying to gain access.

The technology is called "CAPTCHA", or in our case "reCAPTCHA" and is quickly being the standard for online protection against robots, which pose a real problem to web sites. This is replacing the (to me) very irritating practice of trying to figure out what letters and numbers they are showing in fuzzy text. #### Gazette PUBLICATION DEADLINE:

#### SUBMISSION CRITERIA

Please use a common open source FONT such as ARIAL that can be displayed in all Browsers, and is easy to read. Please do NOT use the Calibri font, as we must take the time to convert it to Arial.

If your document has an embedded image, you must also include the image separately as a jpg, png, or similar image file.

## **Visitors to Train Mountain:**

Train Mountain is very popular and is continually attracting visitors from throughout the world. We announce that our hours are from 10:00 AM until 3:00 PM Monday through Friday during the summer, and 10:00 AM to 2:00 PM during the winter. The office is closed on weekends except during meets, and then only when volunteers are available to open the office.

Our insurance advisors request that all people (members and visitors) complete and sign a liability release. If **YOU** as a member encounter visitors on the property without a visitors pass please direct them to the office so that we can insure that a release has been completed and a visitors pass has been issued.

If **YOU**, as a member, open the gate and allow visitors to pass through - **YOU** are responsible to see that the release has been completed, and **YOU** are liable for them until they sign a release. Releases are available in the mailboxes near the office for those times the office is closed. There are also releases available in the kitchen and in the back shop.

If you do not want to, or do not have the time to, ensure that the releases are completed - then please graciously explain that the train park is closed to visitors and that the open hours are normally (Winter - 10:00 AM until 2:00 PM)(Summer - 9:00 AM until 3:00 PM) Monday through Friday. To arrange other hours visitors should call the office at 541-783-3030.




