On Track

As the Fall Colors meet comes and goes, and the mornings are getting cooler and cooler, the Track Maintenance projects are wrapping up. It has been a good year, with a lot of projects being moved from the "Need to do" column to the "Completed" column.

Track replacement projects would not be possible without all the support from people working in the Track Shop, helping to make track panels and switches. This is a lot of never-ending work and has been led by Linsday Eddy. With the help of a lot of visiting members, Lindsay has

cranked out a *ton* of track panels. Everyone needs to tell Lindsay Thank You for her Track Shop work the next time you see her.

During the first week of October, in conjunction with the Fall Colors Meet, a group calling themselves the "Wonder Bread Crew" were here and worked to replace all the track around Youngstown. The aluminum-on-wood main line was replaced with steel-on-plastic track, which is a little over 850



feet long! The track that was removed from the main was then used to replace the sidings. The next time you are on the Serpentine, you can thank the Wonder Bread Crew for a very smooth ride.

This year, we also replaced the track in the Benji siding on Dogwalk, replaced the track at Woodpecker siding on the north side, and replaced the track in the Douglas siding before the entrance to Aspen Loop. Some stubs were also added to some of the sidings.

There was a lot of random single-section track replacement, and lots of tie-replacement work was done on older wooden switches. We have found that the old aluminum-on-wood switches are in good shape – just the ties are shot. Replacing the ties with the switch in place can basically renew the switch without having to take it out of service.

A project that took a lot of time this year was installing an electrical conduit from the back shop to the containers. In addition to digging and filling in a big ditch, most of the tracks and switches into the back shop were replaced.

Track work is just an ongoing maintenance requirement that every member can help with, which leads me to the Wonder Bread Brew.

THE WONDER BREAD CREW

Train Mountain and members like me who do Track Maintenance projects are extremely lucky to have groups of members who come as a group to help out on large maintenance projects. This month one such group showed up and helped me with the Youngstown Replacement Project.



The group, whose main organizer is Matt Thomas, showed up with Ron Demoe, Kim Beard, new member Dennis Matzen, and a bunch of others who replaced over 1800 feet in a pretty tough week.

This group has taken on some other big projects over the years that might be familiar. One time, they replaced 45,000 screws in the main yard to add life to the really tired ties. They cleaned up Aspen Grove, stacking all the downed trees and making the grove look really nice. They worked

on some of the track replacement thru Timberlake. They were responsible for laying the track for the Aspen bypass last year, and for the conduit ditch at the back shop. This is just a few of their projects. Their help and support are truly appreciated and make our club a much better place.

But don't feel left out! Anyone can form their own crew, and have a lot of fun helping out your railroad. Gather a group of your friends, choose a week when everyone takes vacation time, and come to Train Mountain to work really hard, and still have time to run your trains. You need to pick a clever name, have a great organizer, and bring Tylenol! You will need it.

It's not all work—they got to ride their trains!

I have received complaints from members regarding the dog policy not being followed. Bringing your dog to Train Mountain is a privilege and you can be asked to remove your dog from the property. This policy is in effect to provide safety to other members and to the dogs themselves. If people continue to disregard the Dog Policy, we will take action to ensure the policy is followed. That will be less enjoyable for everyone with a dog.

Cheryl McInnes made a generous donation that allowed us to build a secure Dog Park where the dogs can be let loose. However, they must be monitored by a human. **Dogs are not to be left unattended.**

The following is taken directly from the TM Website and can be found under the heading of Train Mountain Documents. If you have any questions about this policy, please contact me or any TMI or TMRR Board Member.

Train Mountain Dog Policy

Nice dogs are allowed on Train Mountain property; problem dogs are not.

- 1. Problem Dogs may be banned from the property by agreement of both TMRR and TMI.
- 2. Dogs must be on a leash except when they are secured in a railcar.
- 3. Dog owners must pick up their dog's poop and dispose of it properly.
- 4. Dogs must behave in a quiet and orderly manner. Those who frequently bark or yap will be banned from the property.

5. Only Service Dogs will be allowed in Central Station or any of the following areas: Living Quar-

ters not on long term lease, areas where food is processed, meeting areas, or office spaces.

Train Mountain Excursions

Since January, Pam Williams has been developing a Train Mountain Institute Fundraiser called the Train Mountain Railroad Museum Excursion. The intention of these Fundraisers is to expose more of the public to the many aspects of our unique Train Park and 2200 acres of Private Forest. A fund-raising fee is requested and has been well received by those attending or expressing interest. As a non-profit organization, TMI needs to find ways to increase donations in a creative and public-minded manner.

The first two of those events happened during the Fall Colors meet. These Excursions are multiple faceted and include, the Visitor Safety video, PowerPoint presentations on the flora and fauna of the Klamath Basin and the Train Mountain Property, in particular. Discussion of Railroad Safety and Operations with comparisons about how the Train Mountain Railroad operates is included. The pinnacle of the Excursion is a custom picnic at Hope Circle Shelter. They take about six hours and cover over 90% of the Mainline Track on Train Mountain. Upon return to Central Station, tours of the Back Shop and Wood Shop are offered.

More TMI Fundraising Excursions will be offered during 2024 Meets, by reservation only. Meet dates are posted on Page 1 of this issue of *The Mountain Gazette*. There are flyers in the Visitor Center with details and a video posted on the Facebook page.




The Eclipse at Train Mountain **Joyce Merwin**

Next up is the April 8, 2024 total eclipse. It won't look total at Train Mountain, but should be fun!




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
2022 Triennial Video Now Available

Visitors to Train Mountain and YOU:

Train Mountain is very popular and is continually attracting visitors from throughout the world. We announce that our hours are from 9:00 AM until 3:00 PM Monday through Friday during the summer, and 10:00 AM to 2:00 PM during the winter. The office is closed on weekends except during meets, and then only when volunteers are available to open the office.

Our insurance advisors request that all people (members and visitors) complete and sign a liability release. If **YOU** as a member encounter visitors on the property without a visitors pass please direct them to the office so that we can insure that a release has been completed and a visitors pass has been issued.

If **YOU**, as a member, open the gate and allow visitors to pass through - **YOU** are responsible to see that the release has been completed, and **YOU** are liable for them until they sign a release. Releases are available in the mailboxes near the office for those times when the office is closed. There are also releases available in the kitchen and in the Back Shop.

If you do not want to, or do not have the time to, ensure that the releases are completed - then please graciously explain that the train park is closed to visitors and that the open hours are normally (Winter - 10:00 AM until 2:00 PM) (Summer - 9:00 AM until 3:00 PM) Monday through

Train Mountain is a NO SMOKING Facility

During recent events, many Members and their Guests have been ignoring this policy. There are only three designated smoking areas at Train Mountain:

- (1) Outside the front of the Backshop
- (2) Outside the east door of the Hall of Flags
- (3) Outside the Motor Pool (Maintenance Building)

Due to the high fire danger at Train Mountain during the summer, we have zero tolerance for anyone smoking outside one of the designated areas.

There is NO SMOKING anywhere out on the track!

Members, Guests, and Visitors that continue to violate the Train Mountain Smoking Policy may be asked to leave.
