From The President of Train Mountain - Jeff Mills

This is the last article I will write as Train Mountain Railroad President. **John Cooper has been elected as our new President**. Please welcome him to his new position on the Train Mountain Railroad Board. Please **continue the support which was granted to me** by the Train Mountain Members and Staff.

In reflection of my five years in office as President it was very eventful and rewarding. Recounting some of the major events and accomplishments; the completion of the main line track with steel rail on plastic ties, two Triennials, completion of the second row of containers and the travel lift, a major forest fire on the north property, flash flood and more damaged track, repair of fire damage, passing of members, establishment of the Train Game, continuing improvements to the Ops meet, 7 meets a year, continuous removal of forest debris and improvement of the equipment for this removal. All of these were made possible by the strong cadre of volunteers who contribute their time and effort to Train Mountain. I say," Thank You, Volunteers".

The **Big Build Meet** was attended with great enthusiasm. However, a **change of plans** was made after the work week started. It was determined that just releveling the **Panama Canal** Track was not going to **fix the drainage problem**. A **drainage ditch on the south side** of the tracks was started and will be finished in the next weeks. The track panels will be removed, and **cross drain perforated pipes will be laid**. These will allow **drainage to the downhill pipe** to be laid in the ditch. This drainpipe will have an exit at the end of the grade crossing under the tracks and downhill. Thanks to Joe Myall for the **use of his small backhoe** and to Richard Cox's expert equipment operation and civil engineer knowledge.

Other work accomplished during this work week included **repair and ballasting of several track problems** by the Idaho Mafia. There were **four new switch operators** installed by a crew consisting or Danny Chamrad, Kirk Devine and myself. Two at the new track addition from Beauchamp to Elizabeth River track to be laid this October and two at K&W track leading into the K&W Station. The **track shop was busy** constructing track panels. Dale Furseth and Dennis Ward got the switches set for the **new track and a siding laid** to allow track panels to be staged. They also got **a ballast tipple installed** for the ballasting of the new track. Other projects included finish work on **the loft bathroom remodel**.

The **Hope Shelter** crew led by Roger Rude, and Leonard Houpt were able to get the rafters set on the shelter. This was **no small job** as these **rafters were quite large and heavy**. Several volunteers assisted in this work along with Luke Conner operating the skid steer forklift. As of the following Monday the **metal roofing was being transported out to Hope**. Though the completion of this project is nearing, we **still require donations for funding of the materials**. The work week was followed by run days and the meet banquet.

The **next meet Is the Fall Colors**, October 7th to 10th. While there is not a scheduled work week **come early as there are plenty of jobs needing to be done to winterize the park** and our equipment. The **Aspens** should be exhibiting their **bright colors** for our enjoyment.

Channel 10 Medford took video to produce a "Day Tripping" segment on Train Mountain. It aired on September 16, 2022 at 6 AM.






2018 Triennial Video Now Available



I AM NOT A ROBOT!

There have been a few changes made to the member's site, specifically where payment information is entered. The most noticeable change is that we have added a question asking if you are a robot. You check the box and depending on a bunch of things, you may be asked to choose from a set of pictures. You may be asked to click the pictures that show street signs, or click on pictures that show store fronts. It seems silly, but the questions and challenges are carefully crafted and updated by Google, and have an amazing success rate at determining if the entity pressing the keys is a real person or a computer program ("robot") trying to gain access.

The technology is called "CAPTCHA", or in our case "reCAPTCHA" and is guickly being the standard for online protection against robots, which pose a real problem to web sites. This is replacing the (to me) very irritating practice of trying to figure out what letters and numbers they are showing in fuzzy text. If you have questions or problems getting around the new challenge (or if you are a robot!), feel free to give Joyce a call in the office.

Gazette PUBLICATION DEADLINE:

Submissions to the Gazette must be received by the 15th of the month of publication. The fifteenth of the month is to be the last day to submit material. Material received after the 15th of the month may be held until the following month or rejected.

SUBMISSION CRITERIA

Articles and ads may be submitted via a pdf file, MS WORD, Open Office, notepad, or similar text file attached to an email. The email SUBJECT line must include your article title and a date.

Please give each article a distinct file name with your name and a date. If everyone submits an article named "article for gazette" or something similar it will often get overwritten by another article with the same name when downloading. Articles sent as text in a email text will no longer be accepted.

Please use a common open source FONT such as ARIAL that can be displayed in all Browsers, and is easy to read. Please do NOT use the Calibri font, as we must take the time to convert it to Arial.

If your document has an embedded image, you must also include the image separately as a jpg, png, or similar image file.

Visitors to Train Mountain and YOU:

Train Mountain is very popular and is continually attracting visitors from throughout the world. We announce that our hours are from 9:00 AM until 3:00 PM Monday through Friday during the summer, and 10:00 AM to 2:00 PM during the winter. The office is closed on weekends except during meets, and then only when volunteers are available to open the office.

Our insurance advisors request that all people (members and visitors) complete and sign a liability release. If **YOU** as a member encounter visitors on the property without a visitors pass please direct them to the office so that we can insure that a release has been completed and a visitors pass has been issued.

If **YOU**, as a member, open the gate and allow visitors to pass through - **YOU** are responsible to see that the release has been completed, and **YOU** are liable for them until they sign a release. Releases are available in the mailboxes near the office for those times when the office is closed. There are also releases available in the kitchen and in the Back Shop.

If you do not want to, or do not have the time to, ensure that the releases are completed - then please graciously explain that the train park is closed to visitors and that the open hours are normally (Winter - 10:00 AM until 2:00 PM) (Summer - 9:00 AM until 3:00 PM) Monday through Friday. To arrange other hours visitors should call the office at 541-783-3030.

Train Mountain is a NO SMOKING Facility

During recent events, many Members and their Guests have been ignoring this policy. There are only three designated smoking areas at Train Mountain:

- (1) Outside the front of the Backshop
- (2) Outside the east door of the Hall of Flags
- (3) Outside the Motor Pool (Maintenance Building)

Due to the high fire danger at Train Mountain during the summer, we have zero tolerance for anyone smoking outside one of the designated areas.

There is NO SMOKING anywhere out on the track!

Members, Guests, and Visitors that continue to violate the Train Mountain Smoking Policy may be asked to leave.
